

#### Introduction



- Mercury, neurotoxicant which presents a serious risk to human health and the environment;
- One of 10 chemicals of major public health concern in WHO list
- Regular use of skin creams >> Rashes, skin discoloration and blotching.
- Long-term exposure >> serious health consequences, including damage to the skin, eyes, lungs, kidneys, digestive, immune and nervous systems.
- Many national governments have banned or set 1ppm Hg content restrictions + Minamata Convention now in place
- Toxic trade of often illegal mercury-added skin-lightening products is a global crisis

## **Background & Overview**

- Mercury has long been used in cosmetics and is a hazard to users, their families and the environment
- In 2017-18, ZMWG analyzed 338 skinlighteners from 22 countries and found Hg levels from 93 to 16,353 ppm



- In 2019, we expanded testing to products previously and currently identified by governments as over the legal limit
- Results show that many high mercury products are available locally
- Also show widespread availability from internet marketers
- Enforcement is key!





## 2019 SAMPLING ROUND

- 158 samples purchased in 12 countries.
- 95 were found to violate the 1 ppm mercury limit. (i.e. 60%)
- Mercury levels from 40 ppm to over 130,000 ppm.
- XRF and/or AAS
- Testing confirms the same high Hg brands available on several sampling occasions in different years.

## ZMWG COMPANION REPORT ON ENFORCEMENT MEASURES

- Legal framework, mandates and division of responsibilities, labelling
- 2. Supporting tools and measures (alert systems, detention lists)
- 3. Inter-agency, national, regional and International Collaboration
- Inspections and sanctions, screening, tools, informing consumers

# Steps needed to screen out high mercury cosmetics

- Training of customs officers
- Screening with XRF
- Labelling: ingredients, producer, country of manufacture etc.
- Internet/local market surveillance
- National detention lists
- Civil society could assist





## **Conclusions**

- Toxic trade of often illegal mercuryadded skin-lightening products is a global crisis
- Many high mercury creams available from internet platforms and in shops
- Legislation, key first step enforcement serious challenge
- International collaboration, setting up alert systems is highly recommended among other measures.
- Each country needs to carry out its own analysis to identify the best way forward.
